<u>Returned Mail / Locating Inmates</u>

<u>RETURNED!</u> Sometimes letters sent to a prisoner get **returned**. Possible reasons are:

- The inmate paroled (no longer at the prison). (The person will not be found on inmate locator).
- Prisoners got **moved** to another prison
- The inmate ID on the envelope was missing or incorrect
- A violation of that prison's mail policy. Increasingly prohibited are: > Contact Prison Mailroom <
 - Cards with raised sections / Cards with glitter / Cards period.
 - Paper with lines on it. (Inane policies are rare but do exist in some institutions.)
 - Single-spaced type. (Inane policies are rare but do exist in some institutions.)
 - MISSOURI: **NO CARDS!** (Only e-Cards) / Maximum 10 items per envelope (i.e. 10 sheets)
- A recent change of prisoner's mailing address statewide (new state-central mail processing center)
 - Effective 5/9/22 all **FLORIDA** inmate mail must be sent to a central location for scanning and routing. Send to: InmateName, DC#, PrisonName, PO Box **23608**, Tampa, FL **33623**
 - Effective 6/15/22 all **MISSOURI** inmate mail must be sent to a central location for scanning and routing. Send to: InmateName, DC#, PrisonName, PO Box **25678**, Tampa, FL **33622**
 - o Increasingly, states are centralizing inmate mail processing at one location (as seen above)

PRISON MAIL POLICY: Each prison has its rules governing the acceptance of inmate-bound mail. Although this varies for each institution, there are some common policies. The prisoner's unique *inmate identifier code* must be correct and **positioned** *next to* **the inmate's name** (to the right or below) **on the mailing envelope**. (This identifier code is most often referred to as the "CDCR number", "DOC number", "DC number" – depending on the state)

INMATE LOCATOR: At times it is necessary to go online to "locate" an inmate – to find their address - using their name and/or *inmate identifier code*. (The locator provides *address, sentence, incarceration date, release date*)
